Dear Friends in Christ,

As we begin the season of Lent on Ash Wednesday, February 14, let us recall the words of the Apostle Paul delivered to us all in Philippians 4:6-7:

There is no need to worry; but if there is anything you need, pray for it, asking God for it with prayer and thanksgiving, and that peace of God, which is so much greater than we can understand, will guard your hearts and your thoughts, in Christ Jesus.

Our world desperately needs peace. When seeking it, we are blessed by the writings and wisdom of the late Henri Nouwen. In his book, *Reaching Out: The Three Movements of the Spiritual Life*, he describes the Christian life as a journey of reaching out to our innermost self, reaching out to our fellow human beings, and reaching out to God. The third movement of the Spirit, reaching out to God, requires three "rules"—contemplative reading of the word of God, a silent listening to the voice of God, and a trusting obedience to a spiritual guide. "Without the Bible, without silent time, and without someone to direct us, finding our way to God is very hard and practically impossible."

According to John Calvin, father of Presbyterianism, Lent is a "superstitious observance." He believed that fasting, denying oneself food during Lent, was a practice that was developed by the church but not taught by Christ. One blogger, when reading this excerpt from Calvin's *Institutes*, wrote, "Calvin is a moron!" That is a little harsh. But I believe Lent can be a time of drawing our focus to the scriptures, to silence, and to guidance provided by a spiritual director. God really wants a "fast of the heart," a time when, as Theophan the Recluse (1815-1894) wrote: "one must descend with the mind into the heart, and there stand before the face of the Lord, ever present, all seeing within you." The Russian Orthodox Church has given us the gift of "The Jesus Prayer" which helps us draw our mind deeper and deeper into the presence of Christ. The Jesus Prayer is, "Lord Jesus Christ, have mercy upon me." "Lord Jesus Christ, have mercy upon me." "Lord Jesus Christ, have mercy upon me." Over and over, we are invited to pray this prayer—audibly, softly, with every breath. This is a gift and, when practiced, Lent becomes a deeper journey and life itself is richer and fuller.

So, as the season of Lent begins, let us read the word of God contemplatively. Let us be silent and listen for the voice of God. Let us identify a spiritual guide or director and be obedient to the wisdom that they share. Whether participating in Second Pres downtown or online, I invite you to listen, really listen for God to speak.



What are Special Offerings? Why do we receive them?

Four times a year, Second Presbyterian Church participates in the special offerings of the Presbyterian Church (USA). Through these offerings, received across the denomination, we live out our calling to be a Matthew 25 church. By giving to these offerings we witness to Christ and together we have a collective impact as we further the ministry of the Presbyterian Church,

One Great Hour of Sharing is the single largest way that Presbyterians come together every year to build a better world by providing relief from disasters (Presbyterian Disaster Assistance), addressing hunger (Presbyterian Hunger Program), and empowering others (Self-Development of People). Received on Easter.

Pentecost helps children at risk, youth, and young adults. Half of this offering is designated by Second Pres for at-risk children in Richmond. Received on **Pentecost**.

Peace and Global Witness is received on **World Communion Sunday** and promotes ministries of peace and reconciliation, especially in cultures of violence and conflict. Half of this offering is designated by Second Pres for an international partner addressing these issues.

Christmas Joy Gift provides financial assistance to church workers and their families and also equips communities of color to build leaders by enabling them to attend Presbyterian schools and colleges. Received beginning with the third Sunday of Advent.

In addition to our pledges and giving to Second Presbyterian Church, we give to these four offerings to extend God's work through our denomination. Plan now to give to all four that God's love may reach even further, to make a difference, a greater difference than we can do by ourselves.

Session Highlights

At its December 16, 2023 meeting, the session took the following actions:

- 1. Approved a utilization policy for the "Child Care Center" Fund including renaming it the "McDowell Fund" in honor of the bequest by John McDowell. The McDowell Fund is a board-restricted fund. The assets of the McDowell Fund shall be used to support the Sprout School at Second Pres and its mission serving its students. In this regard, its uses should serve the Sprout School children and staff in transformative and meaningful ways related to the children's education and experience at the school. Disbursements from the earnings of the McDowell Fund require approval of the Mission and Advocacy Council. Should the Sprout School at Second Pres cease to exist, or cease to be associated with the church, the McDowell Fund will be used to support children's education generally, with an emphasis on education provided to children regardless of income.
- 2. Dissolved the Child Care Center Taskforce with gratitude and great thanks. Members who served were Cherry Peters, Mac Pence, Sheri Highfill, Cathy Howard, Gene Roland, and Hannah Garrity.

Session Highlights (continued)

- 3. Approved the cost of up to 20 spaces in the parking deck for Sprout School teachers and staff to be withheld monthly from the payout to Second Pres. The provision of parking to the School was one of the provisions of the Affiliation Agreement between the YWCA (owners of the School) and Second Pres.
- 4. Received as information the treasurer's report (Carolyn Brandt) stating that expenses for October 2023 were less than budgeted and income was greater than budgeted, resulting in a surplus of over \$18,000. Best of all, pledge income exceeded the budgeted amount for the month by over \$37,000 and there was no need to supplement income by allocating prepaid pledges.
- 5. Budget and Finance Council (Anne McDonnell, chair): The final 2021 financial review document is complete and the 2022 review process is starting. UKirk funding will be sent to the Pace Center, a joint ministry including the Rev. Russ Kerr, PC(USA) pastor and member of the Presbytery of the James (POJ). The first draft of the 2024 budget is complete.
- 6. Approved the remaining Employee Retention Tax Credit (\$85,308) be placed in Fund 2 for Walk-In and Shower ministries.
- 7. Communications of thanks were received from the RVA Ringers, the Pace Center, Health Brigade, Virginia Interfaith Center, and the POJ for the detailed mission study and financial data.
- 8. Approved returning to passing the offering plates and allowing deacons to be added to the communion server rotation.

At its January 16, 2024 meeting, the session took the following actions:

- 1. Transferred Betty & Greg Dickie to Brown Memorial Park Avenue Presbyterian Church, Baltimore, Maryland.
- 2. Approved receiving the four special offerings of the PC(USA): One Great Hour of Sharing, Pentecost, Peace and Global Witness, and Christmas Joy, as well as the 5-Cents A Meal offering.
- 3. Received as information the treasurer's report (Carolyn Brandt) for November 2023. Pledged offerings and investment income were higher than budgeted (the pledge total did include the remaining 2023 prepaid pledges). Expenses were higher than income due to the distribution of the semi-annual mission allocations. Therefore, the statement shows a deficit of \$45,008. However, our financial status remains strong because we have not yet allocated a portion of the prior year surplus or the 4th quarter draw on the General Endowment earnings.
- 4. Approved using some of the remaining "Shining the Light" capital campaign funds to rehab and stabilize the Courtyard Gate (approximately \$7,000) with due diligence to assure that the work is in accord with the historic rehabilitation tax credit requirements. The balance in the campaign fund is \$58,006. It will be totally expended when \$25,000 is used for the vestibule (sanctuary narthex) glass entrance enclosure and the Timeline history project in the second-floor hallway.
- 5. Elected David Wilson, Katherine Goodpasture, and Rob Fergusson to serve as commissioners to the February 17 stated meeting of the POJ.
- 6. Received thanks from Camp Hanover for support.
