


"We have a lot to give thanks for at Second," said Kate Fiedler.

During budget discussions, we learned that everything is in really good shape financially when it comes to the 2023 budget. Two areas that Budget and Finance Committee are watching are the Monday Walk-In lunch and Tuesday shower ministries, due to increasing costs and demand. Recently, 173 people attended the Walk-In lunch, and 30 people came for showers. When guests stop by to take a shower, they also receive toiletries, undergarments, clothing, coffee, and a snack.

All this is possible due to the "the extravagant generosity of Second" as Dixon Kerr pointed out.

While there has been much joy this season, Kate concluded our meeting with an important message for deacons. "This can be a really difficult season for some people, especially those who are anxious about a diagnosis, estranged from family members, or grieving," she said. "Think about the ways you may reach out."

On December 17, the Pastor Nominating Committee was elected by the congregation during a congregational meeting.

In early January, the PNC and staff will be trained by the Rev. Leigh Anne Ring, the Presbytery of the James Presbyter for Relational Care. After being trained, the PNC will work together to create the Ministry Discernment Profile (job description).

Once the MDP is approved by the session and the POJ's Commission on Ministry, it will be posted to the Church Leadership Connection system, and the PNC will begin the work of reviewing and interviewing candidates.

We welcomed the Rev. Russ Kerr during worship on Sunday, December 10, to share a Moment for Mission about the ongoing partnership between Second Pres and the campus ministry at the Pace Center.

Here are the highlights of his Moment for Mission:

I am the PC(USA) Campus Minister at VCU - on staff at the Pace Center for Campus Ministry located in Monroe Park. A lot of you are probably wondering how PC(USA) campus ministry at VCU has continued? Like many things in this season of expectant waiting, God is doing lots of new and exciting things!

It is because of the partnership with Second Presbyterian, formed by Kelley Connelly, and sustained through financial and volunteer support, that Pace has seen exponential growth this semester.

In our growth, Pace is really excited to share that <u>over 1,200 VCU students</u> have come through our doors this semester! Yes, that is 1,200.

The Pace Center hosts many programs. Here are a couple of highlights I'd like to share:

- The first, a Church Crawl. A group of students attend Open & Affirming churches within walking distance of VCU. The group of college students have twice attended Second because of this program. One student mentioned it was the first time they had ever heard a woman preach. How powerful to have that experience here in the Sanctuary of Second!
- A second highlight is a small group that is attending the Montreat Conference Center Collegiate Conference in early January. A group of three students will make the trek from Richmond to Montreat for three days of worship, fellowship, and renewal. Two students will be attending Montreat for the first time.
