How do you measure a year?

The musical *RENT* sings that a year is comprised of 525,600 minutes, measured in sunsets, midnights, cups of coffee, laughter, strife, and mostly measured in love. Last May, I wrote a letter for the front page of the Second Press, giving thanks for the ministry of Ginger and Alex Evans, and outlining the work of our Interim Team: Fred Holbrook, Roger Gench, and Mary Jane Winter. I am so grateful for the ways our Interim Team has led us! This year, I want to share a few places where the Spirit has shown up and reminded me that there is much to celebrate at Second Pres over the past year.

At Second Pres, we can measure a year by the movement of the Spirit!

- Over the summer of 2023, we had five different groups travel—to conferences, and one international trip to connect with our mission partners in Guatemala!
 - This was not a slow summer, with youth, choir members, women, staff, and ten of us exploring Guatemala with CEDEPCA. Benjamin Lomeling shared about the power of his experience at the Montreat Youth Conference from the pulpit during Youth Sunday. These trips nurture our community and connect us with friends and other churches in beautiful ways.
- Last fall we completed the Mission Study, with exciting results. The Holy Cow! Consulting survey was well received, with high marks for participation. The survey results also demonstrated that Second Pres is a healthy church, "transformational" with high energy and high satisfaction, and that there were no major concerns or crises that needed attention in the interim. We are able to focus on welcoming guests, creating opportunities for connection, and nurturing relationships among the congregation.
- During Lent, Hannah Garrity and Mary Jane Winter worked to bring back Second Course. These small group Bible studies were a hit! People enjoyed meeting over six weeks in nine different groups to connect and discuss different passages from the season. Again, the energy was high, and people were grateful to be together.
- We have welcomed TWELVE new members—friends in the faith—over the past year. New people continue to find us, get a sense of our worship and community online, and join us downtown. We strive to welcome all who connect with us downtown and online, so keep wearing your name tags and greeting those you don't already know.

This May, we pray for the Pastor Nominating Committee, as they begin the confidential phase of their work, talking with candidates and discerning the person God is calling to serve as the next pastor. This is exciting! We give thanks for their energy, time, and decisions as they work together to pay attention to the movement of the Holy Spirit.

It is clear the Holy Spirit is busy at Second Pres! How have you sensed the work of the Spirit over the last year? What moments have reminded you that the Spirit is still active and hopeful at Second Pres? We carry on, with hope and reminders that the Holy Spirit is in our midst, calling us as a community to welcome and serve our neighbors, to nurture our connections with one another, and to deepen our relationship with God. Given how the Spirit has shown up, I'm even more confident and grateful for our life together.


Pigeon Feathers and Other Stories



Habitat Build Days


Volunteers from Second Presbyterian Church will participate in two upcoming build days with Metro Richmond Habitat for Humanity on **May 24** and **June 7**.

The Pentecost mobiles were created by Harlan McMurray. They represent the tongues of fire that rested upon the disciples' heads in Acts 2.

And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabs—in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power." All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?" But others sneered and said, "They are filled with new wine." (Acts 2:8-13, NRSV)

This installation offers a visual exploration of this sacred moment and celebrates the birthday of the church!
