Friends in Christ,

"In a time of sorrow, in a time of grief, there is a hiding place to give relief."

These lyrics written by Bryan Jeffrey Leech draw us toward God whose endless love is our hiding place. This is a time of sorrow and grief in our world family.

As Christians, we turn to the scriptures for strength and guidance.

In Romans 12:14-18, the Apostle Paul writes:

Bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse them. Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep. Live in harmony with one another; do not be haughty, but associate with the lowly; do not claim to be wiser than you are. Do not repay anyone evil for evil, but take thought for what is noble in the sight of all. If it is possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all.

The New Revised Standard Version calls this section "Marks of the True Christian." I invite us to read and reflect on Romans 12:9-21. There are many directions it can take our hearts and minds as God's Spirit moves among us and our world. I feel drawn to invert verse 15 so that it reads: "Weep with those who weep and rejoice with those who rejoice."

Our hearts break and our eyes weep because of the indiscriminate killing of children, women, and men in Israel and the Gaza Strip. Daily carnage breaks our hearts. Though Psalm 130 is one of thirty individual laments, we pray with the Psalmist, "Out of the depths we cry to you, O Lord. Lord, hear our voices." We earnestly pray for peace in the Middle East, in Ukraine, and in Sudan where six months of war has led to the death of over 9,000 people. Words are insufficient. We weep with those who weep. God, help us.

We weep and we rejoice. We embrace Philippians 4:4-9 where scripture reminds us that God's peace expands far beyond human understanding. God's peace is demonstrably present at the corner of 5th and Main as we worship, study, serve, and fellowship together. God's peace is evident in your stewardship of resources, time, and talents. Having been with you for two months, there is a spirit of rejoicing when, on a recent Monday, we planned for 130 guests and served lunch to 147! We rejoice when 40 guests showered on a recent Tuesday leading volunteers to envision expanding to two days a week! We rejoice that the Sprout School serves 70 diverse and vibrant children daily! We rejoice that your faithful stewardship supported youth attending the Massanetta Middle School Conference and the Montreat Youth Conference this past summer! We rejoice in your faithful support of members attending the Montreat Music and Worship Conference and the Women's Connection Conference.

Yes, we weep with those who weep and we rejoice with those who rejoice. Through it all, it is God who is mightily at work in us and among us and through us. To God be the glory!





Session News

The session met on October 17. Following an opening devotion and prayer, the elders uplifted the family of Richard Samuel "Major" Reynolds III who passed away on September 18.

Among reports received was the treasurer's that, year to date, income continues to exceed expenses. In the memorandum of understanding, the Sprout School was granted up to 20 spaces in the parking deck. Discussion ensued about how Second Pres covers this cost as part of its mission support.

The Budget and Finance Council shared about budget preparations for 2024. It was noted that Stewardship Dedication Sunday is November 19.

Three commissioners were elected for the October 21 stated meeting and for the November 16 called meeting of the presbytery.

Session approved the recommendation from Personnel that the two positions of Children's Minister and Director of Urban Engagement be combined into one. A candidate will be announced upon acceptance of the offer.

The mission study assessment has been sent out to the congregation and the session was asked to attend a meeting on November 9 to hear and receive the study report. A congregational meeting will be called to elect nine members to serve on the Pastor Nominating Committee.

The meeting was closed in prayer including concerns for members and needs within the congregation and the world.
